

What are "Conservation Districts"?

There is a guiet and stoic history behind Conservation Districts in the United States. Conservation Districts have existed nationally since 1939. They were formed in response to the environmental disaster historically known as the 'Dust Bowl'. At that time, the Federal government established the Soil Conservation Act to preserve valuable agricultural soils from erosion caused by wind and water. To balance this federal and state authority to direct the management of their lands, land owners and stewards worked to create locally governed boards or Conservation Districts to carry the local voice of landowners to the government agencies.



Conservation Districts coordinate assistance from all available sources—public and private, local, state and federal—to support landowners and communities in developing solutions to their natural resource concerns. Each Conservation District is a local unit of government consisting of elected Supervisors, with the authority to assess natural resource needs, carry out measures for the prevention and control of soil erosion and the protection and conservation of water resources, and advise state and federal partners on natural resources conservation policies and programs. There are 3,000 Natural Resources Conservation Districts throughout the U.S. In Vermont, fourteen are mandated in Vermont Statute (Vermont Soil Conservation Act; Title 10, Part 2, Chapter 31), with the purpose to "provide for the conservation, development, and use of the natural resources of the state."

The work of Vermont Conservation Districts has evolved through the years according to Federal and State changes in water quality laws and regulations. In addition to their work with the NRCS, Conservation Districts work with local, regional, state and other federal partners to identify and implement programs addressing local resource needs in the areas of forestry, habitat restoration, river restoration and stream bank management, stormwater remediation, urban conservation, and education.

Conservation Districts receive, on average, \$7,500 annually from the VT tax base to maintain the organization. Lamoille County Conservation District leverages \$11 for every \$1 we receive. LCCD relies on grant funds to accomplish the projects listed on the next page and your membership allows the district to write these grants. We are very proud of LCCD's accomplishments and management. The unfortunate reality is that each year, as is the case for nearly all state programs, we face the very real possibility of additional budget reduction or actual elimination. Therefore, we ask for your assistance to speak to your VT Representative about the undeniable value of the Lamoille County Conservation Districts services.

Conservation Districts operate with methods similar to a non-profit, by accessing the valuable resources provided by volunteers within our communities and relying on community members to broaden our capacity. Volunteers plant trees, bundle (waddle) willows, walk rivers and take water samples, and serve as Supervisors on our Board of Directors. We are always looking for volunteers and Board Supervisors and Advisors to the Board (people with knowledge about forestry, organic farming, local foods systems). We truly value their expertise and love of labor! We sincerely thank you, our members and volunteers for supporting and preserving this locally governed representation of landowners. Please contact our office with any natural resource questions, natural resource concerns, ideas for improving our lands, or offers of assistance to accomplish our goals.

2015 PROJECT UPDATES



Vermont Association of Conservation Districts (VACD) and LCCD State-Wide Proposals: Portable Skidder Bridge and Trees for Streams

LCCD and the VACD are working together to provide mini-grants to Districts state-wide to reduce nonpoint source pollution by planting riparian buffers and augmenting the supply of portable skidder bridges throughout the state. To date, the Trees for Streams program has enables districts to plant 35 acres of buffers. The Portable Skidder Bridge Program is in the process of constructing fifteen additional bridges that will be available for loggers.

Trees for Streams 2015

The local LCCD TFS project is assisting Stowe Land Trust to complete a buffer project on Nichols field this May. Students from Stowe Elementary 5th Grade Class will lend a hand to plant HAPPY trees and shrubs!

Portable Skidder Bridge Construction

LCCD will build TWO new Heavy Duty Bridge in late May with assistance from Green Mountain Technology Career Center Forestry Program students. Loggers who are interested in receiving LEAP credits may assist in the construction of the bridges if they have not attended the workshop in the past. Please call Kim for project details and date.

The VACTOR has Arrived!!!

The municipalities of Johnson, Morristown, Richmond, and Waterbury will be using the new Vactor, a stormwater cleaning vehicle vacuum excavator, to clean and maintain sewer, catch basins, and stormwater lines from debris, chemicals, sediments, leaves, and other pollutants that enter storm drains and eventually travel to waterways. LCCD will provide administrative oversight for the towns. Grant funds were secured through Jim Pease, and the VT ANR Stormwater Division, for a VT AOT Municipal Highway Stormwater Mitigation Program Grant.

Connecting the Mid-Lamoille Culvert Project

LCCD has finalized the two identified high priority culverts in need of replacement/retrofit in the Town of Eden and Hyde Park. LCCD will provide funds to further the work by completing a Hydraulic/Hydrogeologic Assessments and Engineered Designs through a LCCD contractor to help secure future funds for construction.





Hyde Park Stormwater Improvement Project

LCCD received a \$75,000 VT ANR Ecosystem Restoration Program Grant to continue its efforts to install stormwater practices to capture non-point source pollutants from entering local streams and waterways. The Hyde Park Stormwater Improvement Project will mitigate the effects of stormwater runoff from developed land areas and promote Green Stormwater Infrastructure (GSI) practices in a waterway that leads to Centerville Brook. Work will begin soon.

Lamoille Strategic Watershed Plan

LCCD received a Lake Champlain Basin Program Grant to create the Lamoille Strategic Watershed Plan that will provide a three-year strategic plan for LCCD to align Lamoille County's natural resource concerns with Lamoille Watershed and Vermont's state water quality concerns. The goal of the project is to build a foundation of deliverables for LCCD to complete based on relevant and up to date technical and informational resources.

Lamoille County Stormwater Solutions Green Stormwater Infrastructure (GSI)

LCCD received an additional Lake Champlain Basin Program Grant for Stormwater Solutions in Lamoille County to raise public awareness and reduce stormwater runoff and future flooding impacts by installing at least three to five GSI projects. he goal of this project is to increase community involvement in the implementation of a suite of watershed restoration practices while improving water quality and reducing stormwater runoff in urban areas.

TROUT SALES 2015

Common Questions and Answers:

Will trout live in my pond? Which trout species is better for my pond?

Trout survive best in cold oxygenated water maintaining a water temperature of 65°. As long as there are springs or a source of water flowing into the pond, small ponds to large ponds will accommodate both species of trout. If waters are not consistently flowing into the pond, then the pond should be at least 8' in depth and shaded to maintain temperatures in summer and winter. Ponds that have well-oxygenated flowing waters support Brook trout best. If water warms in the summer, Rainbow trout have a higher success rate.

How many trout and how often should I stock in my pond? Should I feed the trout?

The number and size of fish depend on the water flow, chemistry, and available food source. The general rule of thumb is 100 8" trout per 1/4 acre of open surface area. If the waters are spring fed, and the temperatures are consistent then stocking once every few years may work. If there are predators such as heron, mink, or fishers present than you may want to stock annually. Large trout will feed on smaller trout that are half their size. Ponds that are older than three years should have enough aquatic insect larvae, worms, tadpoles, etc. for trout to eat. Newer ponds that lack substrate such as a vegetative buffer around the pond, and submerged and benthic plants may not support these natural foods. Feeding fish may cause an increase in nutrients to the pond which can then lead to algae.

What can I do about algae in my pond?

LCCD provides site visits for pond owners to assess pond conditions and make recommendations. Site visits are scheduled in June.

Orders of 6-8" trout must be picked up on May 13th between 12:00 and 1:00 pm at Oxbow Park (at the end of Portland Street past Morrisville Lumber). After 1:00 pm, we will forfeit unclaimed orders and will not keep the trout. Trout are provided in an air sealed large plastic bag. It's best to stock trout immediately in your pond after pick up to insure their survival.

Orders of 10-12" trout will be delivered by the trout farm *any time* on the afternoons of May 13th or May 14th. Price per lot includes delivery. We cannot schedule deliveries. A flag at the delivery site and/or an order confirmation will be left onsite. Please e-mail or include directions to the best location to leave confirmation and specific directions from the nearest route to your pond with your order form and payment. Addresses will be mapped via Google and GPS with other deliveries. Split deliveries within one-mile include a \$30 additional charge.

Order confirmation calls or reminders are not provided. Please retain this information sheet for your records.

Please be sure to note the trout day on your calendars for deliveries and/or pick up orders.

Three meetings were held in late winter to receive community input for the trail.
